Lent - March - 2006

Greetings;

We're entering the season of Lent this week. I always find it so amazing how quickly the seasons go by. Spring will be here soon and we will hear and observe the new life of the season. Lent presents to us new life as well and has taken on a very different meaning in recent times.

Penitence was the main theme of Lent in the history of the church, but the emphasis of this season is now more baptismal. We still observe Lent by fasting or giving of alms but we do it with the purpose of deepening our commitment to Christ. We observe Lent in community and join with others in making a sincere effort to focus on Christ in our lives.

Lent begins with our journey of faith; each of us has a story. We examine our basic baptismal call to be part of Christ. In doing this, it is important for each of us to look at our own personal faith story. Where has God been in our lives? When did we feel as if God was not there? When was God there and we didn't recognize it?

When we are baptized, we become the body of Christ on earth. Lent gives us the opportunity to reflect on how we accomplish this great commission with which we've been charged.

Our faith must be renewed ... our baptismal promises affirmed. Each time we gather for the Eucharist, we hear God's Word and come to the table to be transformed into the Body of Christ.

We bring to that experience our questions, our sinfulness, our hunger and thirst, our need to grow, and our longing for God. As humans,

will have doubts and we will sin. The trick is to recognize that we are only human but will strive to be Christ-like.

As I think about the seasons approaching, it is clear that we at Trinity have been considering our commission as set forth in our baptismal vows.

I find myself wondering where we are heading and I realize that the good people of Trinity, with each other's caring and loving help, are ready to embark on a more active role in making things happen at our church.

I really do get excited thinking along these lines because I can feel the love and the beginnings of the same kind of excitement in all of you.

There are Lenten study groups beginning this month and many other plans in the works.

The lay ministers will be meeting and getting started with visiting the sick.

There is an evangelism committee which is making plans. Many people have stepped up to take care of the smaller but important things that need to be done at the church and the parish hall.

I ask that we all consider giving our time to a new community activity or to an activity at Trinity this Lenten season.

Participation and excitement is stirring in all of us. Please join us to get a feel for more of that at the Lenten study group Wednesdays at 7.

Pastoral Ministry Training

On January 14 Beverly Barton, Hermine Shapiro and Carla Ross attended an all-day workshop at RPH on Pastoral Ministry.

There was a discussion on what religion and spirituality are and how faith affects one's life and healing. We also discussed the role of a "pastoral presence" and how one must prepare oneself to make a pastoral visit -- prayer, center yourself and then LISTEN, LISTEN, LISTEN. Often one's presence is enough to engender a feeling of trust so that at the next visit the patient will be able to talk about what's going on with him. There was extensive background work done before we moved on to role playing.

Using the story of Jacob, we took turns taking the role of Jacob and then that of the observer. That gave us a real idea of how hard it can be to do this ministry. There were times

Deep thanks to those who will serve on the 2006 Vestry: John Schoonover, Senior Warden; Laura Cama, Clerk; Barbara Caum, Treasurer (non voting); Patricia Gurney, Heather Hunsinger, Fanna Proper, Carla Ross and Hermine Shapiro.

The office of Junior Warden is open. Consider if caring for the buildings or arranging their care is something you feel called to.

Our delegate to the 2006 Diocesan Convention is John Schoonover; Hermine Shapiro is the alternate. Fanna Proper has agreed to serve as our representative to the Bridge of Penn-York Valley Churches.

There are extra copies of the Annual Meeting Report available. If you were unable to attend the meeting, please pick one up and read through it. You'll see that the budget reflects that Fr. Ned is working just one day a week for the first six months of the year. After Trula's ordination to the priesthood on July 8, he will be named assistant and will stay on with a small stipend. The day-to-day running of the parish is being handled by Barbara, whose job title and responsibilities have changed to Parish Administrator.

There is a small amount of landscape work remaining to complete the recent renovation of the church building. Also, as of July 1, the Caums will be renting the rectory and there is a great deal of work that needs to be done on that building before then, including a new furnace, weatherization, dry wall and plaster repair, a chimney leak sealed, gutters moved, porch roof replaced and more.

when words failed us in the face of the fierce anger and fear Jacob was expressing in the role playing.

We learned that prayer can be a powerful tool in this ministry and that there are many kinds of prayer. Prayers of lament can contribute toward healing and transformation and identifying and naming what is inside of you. Prayer can help process difficult emotions, break one out of denial and pretense, help us move beyond despair. One must always ask the patient if would like a prayer. To illustrate, Rev. Martin, one of the presenters, read us a few of the beautifully beseeching prayers from the Psalms.

There was much, much more information discussed that affect a successful pastoral ministry. We each received a handbook, "Listening and Caring," by John Savage, which is a guide dealing with communication skills.


It was a full day and well spent.
