Greetings,

It seems such a long time since the last time I wrote this column. But, at the same time, it is amazing how quickly the summer went by. Isn't it funny how when we were eighteen, we thought that time passed so slowly? Not so, any longer.

Erma Bombeck said, "When I stand before God at the end of my life, I would hope that I would not have a single bit of talent left and could say, 'I used everything you gave me'".

We've been talking about our talents and our gifts quite a bit lately. When I think about how fast time passes, I think about the quote from Erma Bombeck.

We have been charged with the duty of providing for others, that we are asked to give of ourselves, and that, in doing so, we must reach out to those considered marginalized, just as Jesus did.

I have been considering for some time how it is I ended up being the rector at Trinity. No, I'm not confused; I just know that there was a force behind me that was not of my own making. I know that in the years before my discernment and final decision to become ordained, there were so many things going on in my life that were nudging me toward this venture.

For example, when I first became an Episcopalian, it was with much convincing on the part of a wonderful priest. He just stopped by my house one day and from then on visited frequently. I was having many doubts. Too much had happened in my life that caused me to doubt even the existence of a God.

Father Peter did not give up. We had long

conversations. Soon, I was not only attending but I was leading the church school, youth group and on the vestry. I knew the minute I walked into that church, before speaking to a soul, that I had found something I'd been longing for; a home.

This was around 1979. It was a long time ago and life has changed a great deal in that time, just as I'm sure it has changed for you.

I could probably write a book about that journey, for it not only brought me to Trinity, but it brought me *into* myself. I learned more about myself in the process of getting to this place and this time than I ever could've imagined.

So, I consider the quote and I consider our duty to be disciples on earth. In doing all this considering, I not only know how but *why* I'm now your rector.

I know that I'm at Trinity through the grace of God. Even while I was blind to the end goal, the force, the little nudges and the big pushes God placed in my road brought me to Trinity.

The reason I'm at Trinity is to help us all become disciples by building a mindset that we are the people Jesus had in mind to work in today's world. I truly believe that Trinity, as the welcoming and loving church it is, will play a big role in this valley to bring Christ into the lives of those who are marginalized.

I know that all of you will do all that you can to welcome people to Trinity and to try and understand people who may have a different lifestyle. But most of all, I know that we have the capacity to love all of God's people.
