Becoming the Catholic I Was

Richard John Neuhaus, a Lutheran minister who converted to Catholicism in 1990, wrote a book called Catholic Matters. He titled the chapter that describes his conversion, "Becoming the Catholic I Was." In retrospect, it

is probably as clear a summary of what happened to me as I could ever devise myself.

I have always been drawn to the Catholic tradition in the Episcopal Church. I loved its richness, the opportunities it offered to be close to our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters and the hope that someday we might overcome our differences and undo the terrible schism of the 16th century. For years, I have studied the Roman Catholic faith and the Anglican response to it, from the Oxford Movement in the 1800's to the more recent interfaith discussions between us. In September, I decided to take the Roman Catholic RCIA classes in order to learn more.

I did learn more, but not in the way I imagined. I expected that I would be taught the Roman view of the Holy Scriptures, their interpretation of Church Tradition, the role of the hierarchy, and so forth. What I did not expect and what proved to be most edifying, was the personal faith that each of the instructors demonstrated during the classes. Rather than a Church of rigid rules and lockstep obedience to them, I found a richness of spirit and tradition and a people of God who are full of the Holy Spirit, just like the people of Trinity.

And thus I found myself on the horns of a dilemma. My response to it was to spend almost all of Lent in a formal discernment process. I struggled every day to learn willingness, attentiveness and responsiveness. As I neared the end of the process, I was blessed with a wonderful gift from God – a clear expression of His will for me. No one could ask for more and no one could reject such a gift. But, of course, it comes tinged with the sadness of leaving.

And so, finally, I take my leave and bid you again that farewell that I earlier stumbled through at our meetings. Please know that I did and do and will continue to love Trinity and all of you. I ask only, as John Henry Newman did in his final sermon as an Anglican, that you might offer this prayer on my behalf: that in all

things I may know God's will and that at all times I may be ready to fulfill it.


Cardinal Newman titled this sermon, "The Parting of Friends." In God's good Grace, may we always be so, in this world and the world to come.

Vestry News


